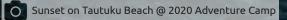

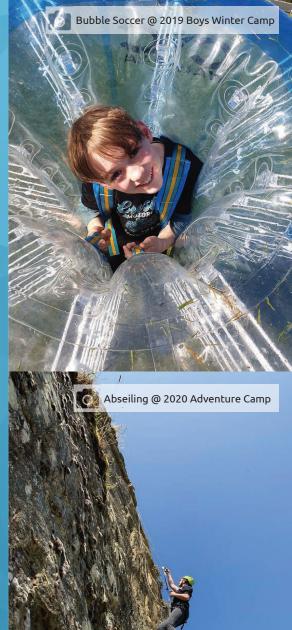

Manager's Report

Throughout the Bible we have the phrase, "from everlasting to everlasting", to describe God. In 1 Chronicles it is used by the Israelites to praise God for the Ark of the Covenant arriving in Jerusalem; in Nehemiah it is used by the Levites in their confession of sin before the Lord; multiple times thoughout the Psalms it is used as a phrase of praise to the Lord and in Habbukuk the prophet cries out to the Lord for justice using the phrase.

I believe that the phrase, "From everlasting to everlasting..." should draw us, no matter who we are, to the thought of eternity. And if our trust is in the Lord then eternity should be something we look forward to with desperate and longing hearts as Romans 8:23 describes. However if we do not know the Saviour then it should invoke a great fear and trembling within our spirit.

From the 1930s to the mid 1960s, a graffiti tag simply saying 'Eternity' was written in beautiful copperplate script with yellow chalk on the pavements of Sydney everyday. Commuters arriving in the city each day would see the word freshly written, but never see the writer, and so, "The man who writes Eternity" became a legend in Sydney. The Sydney City Council got so annoyed about the graffiti appearing every day on their pavements that they got the police to find out who was doing it. have a focus on developing our leaders' potential further, exploring other ministry opportunities and forming partnerships with churches and other ministry focused organisations. Heidi has already visited some organisations to start forming partnerships, has continued to develop the teenage girls group that she was working with during her internship year and has some good plans for other initiatives into the future. I am excited about this new direction our ministry may take under her coordination.

Sarah's role this year has changed slightly to Ministry Camps Coordinator where her core focus will be our Minsitry Camps. These are running well as can be seen in the Ministry Camp Summaries elsewhere in this annual report. Sarah will focus more on liaising with camp directors and camp leaders to help them run better and more compliant camps in this "modern world" of compliance. Sarah has a passion for programming good camps and this desire for wellrun camps allowed our themed junior camps to thrive over this past year with a more cohesive object lesson driven approach. Unfortunately because of the compliance requirements put on us by Government, her role has a "sort of enforcement responsibility" to ensure all our volunteer leaders meet all the requirements that we require to run safe camps. So if she seems a "little bit nagging" in asking for a police vet or to ensure that your training is up to date - it's only because CYC Waihola

has to ensure it is. Unfortunately in July 2019 we had an audit that highlighted some failings in our volunteer leader compliance. Our vounteers need to remedy this into the future lest we lose the opportunity to run our camps under the Government's tick of approval.

I'd also like to give thanks to our regular volunteers that have been on-site this year giving up their time - whether it be data entry work in the office, or painting the myriad of buildings we have here at camp, or tireless landscaping and gardening work, or shifting stock from place to place the list goes on. And you will know who you are. It has been a blessing and a privilege to serve our Lord God alongside you here this past year.

Over the year, I have had the great pleasure of directing three different camps, including our newly created one: the Junior Tramping Camp. This particular camp ran in October and I had the wonderful privilege of taking 7 campers in the age range of 10 - 14 years old down the beautiful Hollyford Valley (a valley that is now effectively closed due to the rain event in December). 4 out of the 7 campers had never slept overnight in the wilderness and this was their first taste of a classic New Zealand tramping trip. Such an experience should be mandatory in every New Zealand kids childhood. The kids really enjoyed their trip and hopefully it is the start of many more like it. I spoke to them about our reason for existing, our

y meaning in life and used a C.S. Lewis d quote as a basis for one of the talks:

"If I find in myself a desire that nothing in this world can satisfy I can only conclude that I was not made for here"

The Summer Boys Camp was another camp I was able to direct. My speaker, Simon Sim, used object lessons from the StarWars movie franchise to share with the boys about a good and loving Father we have in Heaven, about us consistently missing God's mark just like stormtroopers can never hit their target in the movies and the reconciliation and ultimately the redemption of Darth Vader by Luke in the Return of the Jedi as a metaphor for the redemption and reconciliation of us by Christ to God. This camp highlighted how well we can use themes from popular culture at our camps to equate and draw out the object lessons that point towards a Christ centered hermeneutic that especially non-churched kids can understand. After all isn't that what Paul did in Athens in Acts 17?

Let us continue to pray for the ministry of CYC Waihola - that we may remain true to the historic word of God but relevant to the next generation as we share with them "our eternity" in the one true Hope. Just as our mantra in Youth For Christ used to be "One Matters Forever", this remains just as true here today.

Ministry Camp Coordinator's Report

To say CYC is continuing to be blessed by God is an understatement. Daily we are blessed to see His hand upon the work we all do at CYC and continue to be encouraged seeing His kingdom work carried out in the campers' lives.

Throughout the past year we have introduced two new camps to our calendar. In October, Tim Wiel ran a Junior Tramping Camp for 7 children in school years 7 to 10. This camp proved so popular 6 months out from the camp it was already full. By the time the camp came around it had enough campers enrolled to fill the camp twice. This was a great encouragement to the staff at CYC and is something we will be looking at adding to the calendar on a more regular basis in coming years. Then in January 2020 Brenda ran a Summer version of our Pony Camp. Again this proved extremely popular and all the spaces were taken with another 4 girls on the waiting list. The girls all had a great time and especially enjoyed the trail ride over to Tony MacDonnell's farm for the night where they camped out and had an authentic cook-out over a campfire. I am very thankful we were able to run this camp, especially now with Covid-19 impacting our ability to run upcoming April Camps. This summer camp has meant the girls who often only attend our pony camps have not missed out.

We also were able to complete some amazing follow up, with a group of teen girls after running Teen Girls Camp. We were very close to pulling this camp from our calendar due to a decline in interest making it non viable to run. After discussing this at the camping committee and committing it again to prayer, we were encouraged by a sudden influx of enrolments. This led

of the most fruitful camps spiritually on our calendar this past year. A big thanks to Heidi Aarsen who has led the follow up after camp with this group of girls. Running a bible study called ShineGirl and having further follow up weekend camps. It has been great to take our ministry beyond just camps, reflecting the days gone past of Uncle Wallace and his passion for campers beyond camp.

Though we have continued to face the age old challenge of enough leadership we have been blessed to have 150 leaders at our camps this past year. At times leadership has limited the number of campers we have been able to accept on camps. Heidi is working on ways to create ties to churches so we can access more people interested in leading at our camps and also developing ways to strengthen our ties with the current leadership team. Hopefully this will help with future directors' ease in finding leadership for camps.

It has also been noted the challenge directors have in their planning when it comes to the number of leaders now attending camps who are not qualified to run our more speciality activities like Zip lining, Archery or Air Rifles. We acknowledge this is hard but in an everchanging health and safety climate it is important we are keeping our leaders current with regulations to ensure they are running safe activities for our campers and are prepared for any emergencies that may arise. We are working out ways towards making this a smooth process for leaders to achieve the training they need to the Outdoor Mark standard, so they are prepared for our activities when they come to camp.

to the camp continuing and being one This will most likely take more of an online form like our current Induction training. This will enable the theory of each activity to be done before leaders arrive at camp or fellowship days. This should then leave us free to just work on the practical at our face to face training sessions giving people the time they need to run activities. While we understand this puts more time pressure on our leaders, it is an essential part of new health and safety standards that we are required to meet. It also means if anything does go wrong we can show we have completed our due diligence and given our leaders as many tools as possible for running our activities safely.

> Our online training for leaders has been well accessed this year with most of the feedback being very positive about how easy it is to complete and the fun nature of the questions, keeping people engaged as they make their way through the Leader Induction Training. We have also launched risk management training and have our cooks training, speaker training and director training all in development stages. Hopefully, when we are done, this will be an easy way to transfer the information our volunteers need for their individual roles. We realise not everyone is as digitally capable however so we do still have the ability to print these trainings off with questions for volunteers to complete.

the LIT's along as junior helpers instead to our camps. It is so encouraging to see another generation of leaders coming into our leader pools and the enthusiasm they have for our ministry camps. I have been working on a devotional to couple with our LIT program to encourage our LIT's to look at what it is to be a leader at CYC and explore at each camp they attend what new skills they have learnt. This will hopefully be ready for our next round of camps and will help our LIT's to reflect not only on the practical skills of being a leader but look at their Spiritual growth also.

Another blessing of my role as Ministry Coordinator is getting to work with such a wide variety of people to create the camp programs for CYC. Sometimes this can be a challenge to find a balance with directors, as we seek to have the information we need for the lead up to camp in a timely manner while not putting pressure on our directors' often already busy lives. But, in general the wide variety of skills and ideas for each camp is fantastic and it has been a pleasure to work alongside directors and help them where they need. I look forward to what the next vear holds for CYC and to see the further development of camps as we continually work to improve and engage with an ever changing generation of children. Keeping our camps relevant and appealing while sharing the gospel in meaningful ways.

As previously mentioned I also get

to spend part of my time in my role working with accommodation groups in leading them in activities. This has been something I have missed over the last year as I have only been allowed to complete light duties while I waited for my shoulder surgery. However, I have now had this and been cleared so was able over February to work with schools. While this does take away from my role in the office I find that it is an often enjoyable part of my role at CYC as we get to know the groups of children who come through and begin to form bonds with them- often being remembered months on when spotted in a supermarket! It is also an enjoyable time to chat to the kids about what we do at CYC and encourage them to come back to our following camp sessions. I have also even been asked if I am a Christian and whether they have to be Christian to attend our campsoften opening up some awesome conversations.

We were also able as staff to attend the Christian Camping Conference last year. This was held at El'Rancho in Kapiti for 3 days. While there we were able to fellowship with other Christian Camps staff from around New Zealand and share with each other ideas and support. I particularly enjoyed the afternoon workshops on various topics. I attended a few different ones about sharing our faith and now have a few extra resources to use in our leadership training. It was also great to spend time

in fellowship with some of the staff from CYC Ngaruawahia, after I was invited to move into their accommodation chalet. It was a great time of encouragement and seeing how others do their ministry work. Also from it we have added some new practices in our day to day life at CYC including having a short bible reading and prayer time at the beginning of any morning where 2 or more of us are gathered. This has been a great spiritual encouragement, especially seeing God regularly answering our prayer requests.

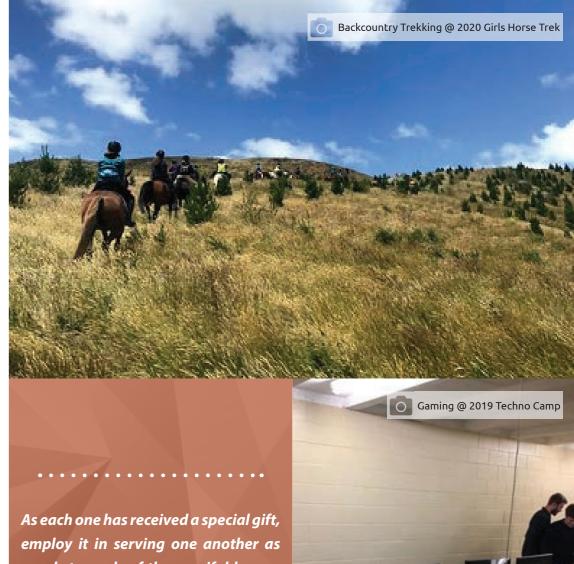

Ministry Development Coordinator's Report

From finishing my intern-ship and moving into a new role here at camp this is what I have been doing over the last year.

The second half of the intern-ship year was similar to the first: completing study and tracking away with ministry work here at camp. I was stoked to graduate at the end of the year with a Diploma in Christian studies. Some of my favourite papers we studied throughout the year were Christian history, systematic theology and the book of James.

Towards the end of my intern-ship year, schools and accommodation groups picked up again which I thoroughly enjoyed as it is an opportunity to get to know the schools and people coming to camp. Accommodation Report

Word is spreading about our how good our camp-site is through-out Otago and beyond. We have gained many new groups this past season who have either never heard of our camp-site or have not been for a decade or more.

One principal commented to me recently about how wide our range of activities is, and how well the CYC Waihola staff look after their school when they are on-site. He told me they wished they had used us sooner.

Also noticed by regular groups this year is our continued upgrade of our facilities with the Main Hall interior painted and re-carpeted along with the bathroom upgrades. Our accommodation groups are impressed!

Whilst our accommodation rental income has stayed relatively static this year our activities income has increased year on year for the past three years with a jump of nearly a third in income just this last year. More groups are using our paid staff to instruct activities whilst they are on-site. This is great as we have put so much effort into compliance and ensuring they are safe for use over the last few years with upgrades and the OutdoorsMark certification we have. Our zip-line and ArcheryTag[™] remains our most popular and most income producing activities.

Schools continue to make up nearly half our income and more importantly an important source of new campers to our ministry camps. Also on the increase are secular weekend groups such as university groups and scout groups, which is sad as I have also noted a downward trend in youth group camps. However, encouraging is that our regular youth group camps are growing in size year on year. Unfortunately, perhaps as a sign of the times, the traditional church family camp is nearly extinct at our camp-site, instead replaced with young adults camps and youth group camps.

Covid-19 only really affected the final 3 weeks of the financial year as far as accommodation goes, with all camps

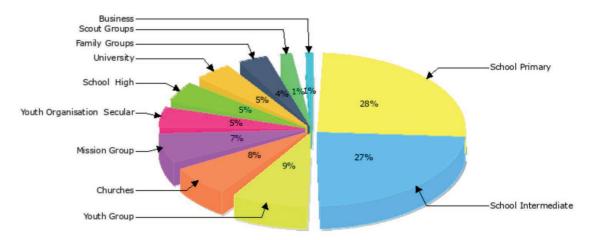
from mid March being canceled. However all but 1 have re-booked in Term 4 2020 filling that term to capacity.

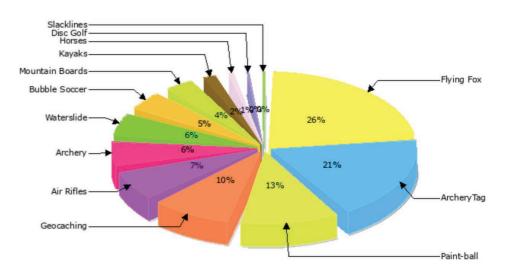
Whilst this did represent a big hit to our finances as 2 of the 8 canceled groups were brand new to us and were tracking to be 2 of the biggest camps we've hosted in the last 10 years with every bed booked, the Lord still blessed us with financial support elsewhere. And 1 of these schools has re-booked for November which is awesome.

Another sad impact of Covid-19 was the incredible drop-off in numbers of Israeli back-packers coming to stay in the Homestead through Celebrate Messiah in the later part of February and March. Time will tell whether the borders will be open for them in Summer 2020/2021. This ministry continues to be an exciting use of our facilities and is the only external group we have that is evangelising the Gospel as their core mission for using our facilities.

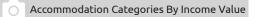

Family Camp 2020 Report

This will be one of the shortest reports there will be, as everyone will probably realise.

Overall it was a well enjoyed camp for the campers and a lot of them were keen to come back to our Summer 2020 camp.

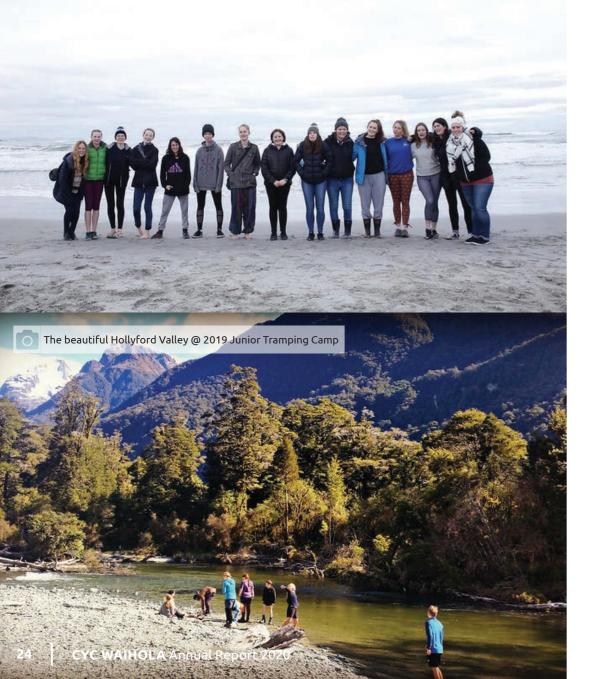
2019 Southern Lads

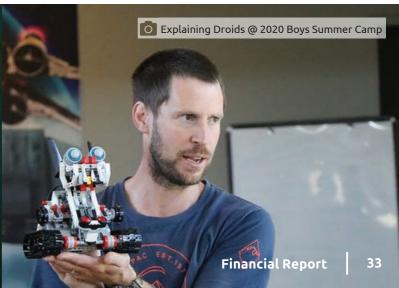

Proposed Society Rule Changes

The following rule changes have been proposed to allow meetings to be held digitally in extraordinary circumstances such as this years Covid-19 crisis.

Outlined below are the proposed rule changes. Additions are highlighted in **bold** text and deletions in **strike** text.

Rule 10 changes to read:

- (a) The Annual General Meeting shall be held at a time and a place fixed by the *Council for the following purposes:*
 - (i) To receive a Report, Balance Sheet and Statement of Accounts for the preceding and an estimate of the receipts and expenditure for the ensuing year.
 - (ii) To appoint an Financial Reviewer for the ensuing year.
 - (iii) To decide on any resolution which may be duly submitted to the meetina.
- (b) Not less than seven clear days before the Annual General Meeting a notice thereof shall be sent to every member either by posted letter addressed to him at his last known place of abode or by email to his last known email

address together with a copy of the Report, Balance Sheet and Statement of Accounts for the year.

- (c) If for any reason determined by the Council of Management, an Annual General Meeting cannot be held in person, then the Council of Management may elect to hold the Annual General Meeting electronically.
 - (i) notice of the electronic meeting must be given to all current Society members as per Rule 10(b) not less than seven clear days before the electronic meeting date.
 - *(ii) "electronically" is deemed to* mean via video or telephone conference, or any other format as the Council of Management may decide.
 - (iii) as per Rule 13 a quorum in an electronic meeting shall remain 8 and will be determined as those members that have been recorded as either being on-line for the duration of the meeting or otherwise taking part in the

electronic meeting.

Rule 15 changes to read:

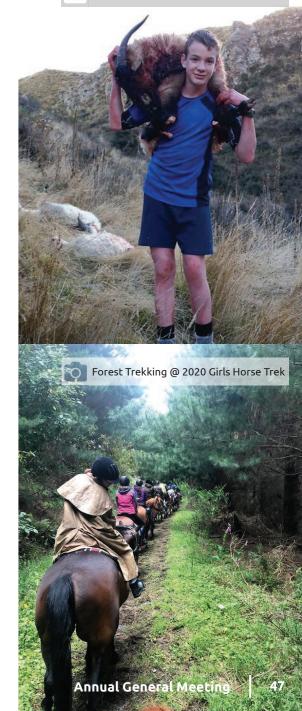
- (a) The Council shall meet at such times and places as shall from time to time be determined by the Chairman and at all such meetings the Council shall determine its own procedure.
- (b) Notice in writing of every such meeting shall be given by the Secretary to each member of the Council and shall be deemed to be duly given if notified either by a posted letter addressed to him at his last known place of abode or by email to his last known email address not less than 3 clear days prior to the time appointed for the holding of the meeting in question.
- (c) At meetings of the Council, seven (7) members shall form a quorum.
- (d) At meetings of the Council, members of Council are considered to be in attendance if connected via electronic means
 - (i) members attendina electronically will be noted in the meeting minutes
 - (ii) electronically is deemed to mean connected to the meeting via

video or telephone conference, or any other format as the Council of Management may decide.

- (e) If for any reason determined by the Chairman that a Council Meeting cannot be held in person then the Chairman may elect to call the *meeting electronically.*
 - (i) notice of the electronic meeting must be given to all members of Council as per Rule 15(b) not less than 3 clear days before electronic meeting date.
 - (ii) electronically is deemed to mean via video or telephone conference, or any other format as the Council of Management may decide;
 - (iii) as per Rule 15(c) a quorum in an electronic meeting shall remain 7 and will be determined as those members of Council that have been recorded as either online or otherwise taking part in the electronic meeting.
