## OPERATIONS MANGERS REPORT

It has been 2 year now since Chris and I came to work at CYC Waihola. During that time, we have both been challenged physically, mentally, and most of all spiritually.



"Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain."

1 Corinthians 15:58

That being said – the work has it challenges. We are constantly aware that we are in a spiritual battle for the hearts of those coming to our camps, as in the leadup to the camps we face multiple hurdles. Difficulties finding leaders, cooks, speakers etc. The paperwork that is required for all the volunteers now rivals applying for and accepting a job.

Application forms, referees, police vetting all ensure the safety of those coming to camp. The Health and Safety legal requirements mean there is pressure on our Directors to have activities that are deemed "safe" (what is safe about going down a waterslide at 40km an hour) or enough paperwork to ensure that all the risks have been thought about and correct measures put in place to run the activity safely.

As a team we have a strong focus for the safety of all those coming to CYC. We want kids to have fun, but we also want them safe. The lengthy conversations we had with our Activities Auditor last year highlighted the need for us to be constantly reviewing what we are doing, how we are doing it and can we do things better. I am a child of the 60's where we climbed trees, rode homemade go-karts down steep streets, galloped horses down the beach without helmets on or drank water from streams and lakes without thinking about water purification tablets! However now I understand the dangers of brain injuries when you fall at heights/speeds and land on your head, or how drinking unclean water can give you vomiting and diarrhea, so I no longer ride without a helmet, I don't drink unclean water and am too old to climb trees.

With learning comes responsibility, so now we have the job to ensure those under our care are safe even when at times it makes our job appear restrictive.

When burdened by the challenges it is great to remember that we serve an awesome God – someone pops into the office with words of encouragement, another person comes to assist with a job that needs doing that cannot be done by just 1 or 2 people, an unexpected donation, a really good teenage apologetics camp which results in 3 more leaders for our ministry camps, or a family camp where we are so encouraged by the teaching and fellowship, that we again can be revived with the enthusiasm that spurs us on.

The past year in the office has been a year of consolidation. Coming to grips with all the legislation that governs our camp, to ensure we provide a safe environment for those coming here has meant that many hours are spent reviewing, renewing and upgrading policies and procedures. Over the last year we have had 2 audits – our large audit on all our Adventure Activities, and the small Food Control Audit. The audit governing our activities takes a lot of time in preparation, 2 days with an auditor on site, and then another few weeks of post audit paperwork. Although the process can be challenging it also is helpful as it creates for us the platform where we challenge ourselves constantly to create an environment that is is line with the legal requirements that are expected from us.

I am very thankful for Nerima who is assisting in this area, particularly in the formatting and design and presentation of the information so that it is easily read and understood. All the school groups that come onsite need to have easy access to our standard operating procedures and risk management paperwork. The website has been a vital key to sharing this information and again in this area the younger members of the CYC team (Annalise and Nerima) have come to the fore as they do the upgrade work.

The work done here is a team effort and I am very thankful for the strengths that each one of the team has and how they complement one another. Chris, with his main focus being facilities, is the go-to person for anything that needs fixed. His quite dependable nature supports the team, and he is relied on to have the right things, in the right place at the right time. Chris and Nerima together focus on running the activities for the school groups while I do all the timetabling and liaising with the school staff. Annalise assists where needed with the school groups, but the Ministry camp focus is where she shines. Annalise's passion for the apologetics camps and the relationships she makes along the way have created the pathway to more young people wanting to serve in the ministry here at CYC.

It is great to see the number of kids coming to our camps increase over the last year. Social media has created an avenue for us to reach more as well as the networking we are doing with the school groups that come onsite. Having a child come to a camp, listen to the speakers and leaders and request a bible before heading home has been so encouraging, particularly when you hear back from the family that the child is reading the bible daily and looking up words in the dictionary to understand them better.

We are considering more ways to follow up with the young people after camps – particularly those who have shown real interest in Christianity.

These stories really show us the importance of this ministry. Chris has recently travelled to Japan with a small number of folk to give 2 weeks of his time to help at a Christian Camp in Aomori. He was really encouraged by working with others to benefit a camp with a vision such as ours in another country, and it showed him the "bigger picture" of other Christian camps in other countries all wanting to share the gospel message. Sometimes it just takes another place, other people (or some of the same in his case) to renew that vigour.

I am constantly aware of the amount of time and effort that go into our school groups. Their use of the facilities and activities creates an income that is needed to support the ministry. However, it is important that we do not lose track of why we are here, and that is to provide the camps to allow the youth of Otago and Southland to hear the gospel message and know and grow in a relationship with Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour.

To maintain a facility such as ours requires people and finances. Financially, times are difficult for many and the ability for families to send children to camp can be seen as a luxury rather than a need. Our sponsorship fund has taken a real hit over the last year as more and more families have called on this support to be able to send their children to camp. We have buildings and facilities that are getting a bit tired and need money spent on them, but creating priority lists is not always straight forward. We have also made a big commitment this year to increasing staff hours and also to the maintenance upgrades to the facilities on site,

Currently we are looking at taking on 3 major commitments. An upgrade to the Main Lodge kitchen, an upgrade to the bathrooms in the homestead, and a rabbit eradication program. Each one comes with a significant cost, and it is so important that we are wise stewards for the property that is under our care. Projects are considered by "need" rather than "want'. I am thankful for our facilities committee who give great guidance, support, and motivation to get the work done.

Despite any challenges that may present, God always provides, whether through donations or continued prayers. We continue to pray that the needs of CYC will be met for many more years to come.

Without the support of our society members on multiple levels (prayer, friendship, labour, camp volunteers and finances) we would not be able to do the work we do, and CYC would not be able to provide the camps and ministry it does to the young people who come here. Chris and I would personally like to say Thank you. The Lord has blessed us greatly with everything we have needed, and we continue to look to Him for the future.

## MINISTRY COORDINATORS REPORT



#### A FULL YEAR AT CYC

As we look back at another year of ministry camps at CYC, let's praise the Lord for His provision, blessing and faithfulness to this ministry. Over and over we see answered prayers, often at the last moment, and are constantly reminded that we serve a God who knows our need, and who delights in answering our prayers when they are in accordance with His will. At Family Camp I had a conversation with a long-standing member and volunteer for CYC, and I remarked at how many people had come, saying "Wow, God has been so faithful," to which she replied "Annalise, God is always faithful. We are the ones that don't always see it." While we know the Lord is before all things, and by Him all things hold together (Col 1:17), I recognise we also have a part to play in stewarding the opportunities He has given us. I would like to spend this next year working hard to revise our cooks and directors trainings, and making these as seamless as possible. Our staff team look forward to revising our policies this year, and hopefully hosting some training days. I am also looking forward to building relationships with more churches in Dunedin, Otago and Canterbury and broadening our volunteer base. I know this is a slow process, so please join me in praying for our volunteer base to broaden and grow.

#### Training

The past year has had more of a "quiet steady approach" with more work being done on the day-to-day maintenance rather than on the larger jobs (but wait... these are coming!)

The Team have put the 3 new water tanks in place with 2 at the top of the property and 1 behind the bunkrooms to be used for the waterslide.

The Archery and Air Rifle shed has been built including a storage lock cupboard for rifles and bows. The final item to complete will be the concrete floor.

We have upgraded the lighting in the Main building, carpet area, kitchen and bunkrooms, 1, 2 and 4. These are now LED strip lights which will be more economical to run.

The final disc golf basket has been moved out of the paddock by the waterslide and up by the new Water tank.

A permanent fence has been put between the waterslide and paddock to the west for better stock management.

The facilities committee have spent time planning a couple of much needed maintenance projects including:

- Main Lodge kitchen there has been a plan that has been agreed on and hopefully the
  work will be done during August this year. This will involve the upgrade of the floor,
  moving the ovens to the other side of the kitchen to enable better drainage,
  ventilation/extraction fan over the ovens, upgrade of the main power switch board, and
  upgrade of cupboard and bench areas.
- Homestead Bathrooms upgrade the toilet/shower facilities so that there is provision for girls, boys and staff. Improve ventilation and upgrade of hot water cylinder.

# ACCOMMODATION REPORT

The lord has blessed us with a very busy year, with school groups being onsite every week in Term 1 and Term 4. Some weeks we had a small group in the homestead at the same time as a large group in the main building and bunkrooms. This takes a bit of juggling with the timetable, but it is good to be able to accommodate the smaller schools as well.

We have had a mix of schools that have been regular attendees over the last few years, and new schools are coming to us for the first time. We even had a group from Springfield in Canterbury. It is wonderful to be able to share our facilities with these groups and in doing so share a glimpse of the ministry we have here. The school pupils are encouraged to come back to our school holiday camps.

The activities we offer are popular and add to our financial income. CYC staff run the Zipline, Archery Tag and Waterslide with training given to school staff to enable them to run archery, air rifles, bubble soccer. We are constantly on the lookout for activities that can be provided for the schools using our facilities, but not necessarily our staff. These will be fun activities, with a lesser risk for the participants. We like kids to come to our camp to have fun, but not go home hurt!

## ACCOMMODATION REPORT

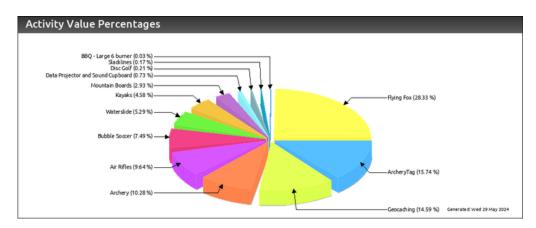

Once this is done, we can do some more marketing to youth groups and small church groups to use the facility more.

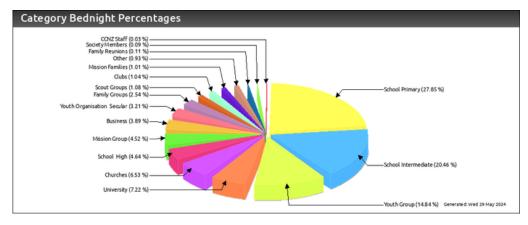

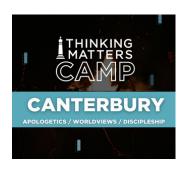
